

Council Minutes 05-09-2013

Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting

May 9, 2013 at 7:00 pm

at the Town Hall on Division Street

1. Mayor Paine calls council to order and roll call is taken. Present L. Marchky, G. Ritchie, P. Seeholzer, M. Feyedelem, G. Finger, and D. Kaminski.

2. All rise and recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

4. Discussion and/or amendments to the April 13, 2013 council minutes. Motion to pass the minutes of the April 13, 2013 meeting as written, made by Seeholzer, second by Finger; Roll call: Marchky- yes, Ritchie- yes, Seeholzer- yes, Feyedelem- yes, Finger- yes, Kaminski- yes; motion carried.

5. Discussion of Pay Ordinance No. 1126, Motion to pass made by Seeholzer, second by Kaminski; Roll call: Marchky- yes, Ritchie- yes, Seeholzer- yes, Feyedelem- yes, Finger- yes, Kaminski- yes; motion carried.

7. Committee Reports

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7.A. Police- Chief Ehrbar reports of activities since the last council meeting: 2 reports have been filed; 85 department phone calls were answered; no arrests have been made; 5 warnings were given for speed and stop signs; one assist was done with KI EMS. Interviews have been completed for the summer season for the Police Dept., and three officers were hired: Aaron Coleman, Rachel Volkar, and Matthew Tkach. Chief Ehrbar requests that council support the purchase of the personal police cameras that were presented at the last council meeting. He adds that a few years ago a camera would have been useful in a court case. Solicitor Lambros adds that the village did get a

conviction in that case. **Motion to authorize the expenditure of up to \$2,100 for personal cameras for the Police Department**, made by Kaminski, second by Finger; Roll call: Marchky- yes, Ritchie- yes, Seeholzer- yes, Feyedelem- yes, Finger- yes, Kaminski- yes; motion carried.

7.B. Safety Committee- M. Feyedelem thanks all the volunteers in EMS and adds that it is EMS month.

7.C. EMS- S. Devine says that there were 5 runs and 4 transports and 2 clinic patients. May 11th is the EMS Spaghetti Dinner at Bag the Moon and May 18th is Safety Forces Day on the Casino Dock.

7.D. Fire Dept.-Tom McNeal reads Chief Hostal's Fire Report: There was one call in April, an assist with EMS. The burning ban will be in effect starting May 24th. The last day to get a burn permit will be May 21st. Some of the Fire Dept. did their CPR re-certifications last week. The class was taught by Sharon Devine. We will be starting our annual training this month and continue it through the summer and fall. The Fire Dept. will again offer fire extinguisher training for everyone interested, probably in June.

7.E. Finance- P. Seeholzer reports that the Finance Committee met and discussed an increase for the EMS Levy . The EMS Department is spending about \$51,000 a year and the current EMS Levy brings in about \$11,000 less than the expenditures run. One of the reasons this has happened is that St. V's is requiring the payment for their services which is \$9,500 annually. In the council packet is the legislation to ask the Erie County Auditor what the millage would be to have revenue from the levy of \$50,000 or \$55,000 or \$65,000.

7.F. Lands & Buildings- G. Finger introduces two people from the audience who are part of the Operation Military Kids program. Teresa Gallardi is from Ohio State and this is her ninth year on the island and Andrew Stewart is the Child Coordinator with the National Guard. Stewart says that it really helps the kids to do the projects on Kelleys Island. During the last month the Lands & Buildings Committee has done some on-site inspections of village buildings. Finger asks for a proclamation for the military kids. They will be working in the downtown park again this year. Solicitor Lambros says that he can write a proclamation but he would like to talk to Mr. Stewart to get information about the group. Seeholzer asks the Village Administrator about the public restrooms on Division

St. Seeholzer thinks that the area next to the sidewalks is bad and there are holes in the siding from stones. Village Administer Scott Stevenson says that will be taken care of before Memorial Day. Village Administer Stevenson is getting estimates to fix up the Boker Barn. Mayor Paine says that maybe the village could fix it cheaply enough, especially the roof, to get by a couple more years out of the building. Stevenson says that the structure is OK and the building can be saved.

7.G. Airport- G. Ritchie passes out paperwork with a chart for his 12 year projection of the FAA improvement plan for the airport and says that he thinks the local portion for FAA grants may increase in the future, so he put an option of 15% local match in his twelve year plan. Ritchie continues that in the future the village will need to ask the voters for a levy to support the airport plan. He suggests that maybe the cost of the plan can be decreased a little more. The report is an estimate for the Airport Capital Improvement Plan – Budgeted Amounts to compare the difference is costs for a 3,300 foot runway and a 2,200 foot runway In December 2009, the FAA estimate for a 3,300 foot runway was \$12,494,000 and at 5% local match that would have cost the village \$625,000. In November 2011, the FAA estimate for the 3,300 foot runway was \$10,534,000 and the village cost with a 5% local match would have been \$527,000. In December 2012 the FAA estimate for the 3,300 foot runway was \$12,104,000. The local cost is now 10% or \$1,210,000. Ritchie says that the FAA revised their estimate upward after their experience at Put-In-Bay. Looking at a 2,200 foot runway, the May 2013 estimate, done by Ritchie, is \$9,114,000, with \$911,000 as the village estimate using the current 10% local match. If the local match goes up to 15%, the cost would be \$1,367,000. The savings between the cost of a 3,300 foot runway and a 2,200 foot runway would be \$2,900,000. Ritchie further explains that if the village airport expansion project took 12 years and the local match was 10%, the annual expenditure would be \$76,000. If the local match goes up to 15%, and the project lasted for 12 years, the annual village cost would be \$114,000 a year plus maintenance plus inflation. This would mean that the village would have to ask the voters for a levy to pay the local share. Seeholzer comments that a 2,200 foot runway would have additional savings over the 3,300 foot runway because the road around it would be shorter and cost less to retain. Finger says that he spoke with T. Griffing and he was OK with a runway length of

2,200 feet. Mayor Paine says that he also spoke with Griffing and he was assured that the 2,200 foot runway length was OK.

7.H. Planning Commission- G. Finger reports that there has been no meeting.

7.I. Design Review Board- G. Finger reports that there has been no meeting.

7.J. Board of Zoning Appeals- G. Finger reports that there has been no activity.

7.K. Transfer Station- D. Kaminski reports that 59 late statements were sent out for the annual Transfer Station billing on April 26th. Of 730 accounts billed, 45 are unpaid to date.

7.L. Village Administrator- Stevenson reports that Krzynowek tested for a Class II operator's license. Matt Tkach will start part time hours in the maintenance department working on streets on his days off from the Police Dept. The Sweetbriar Road Project started this week. Some widths on Melody and Cedar are 16' or less wide and they need to be widened about 2 feet and make sure that the increased width has a good base under it. Ritchie says that the engineer's specs did not specify that there had to be a good base under the chip and seal. Ritchie wants to do three things 1. To make sure the base on Melody and Cedar is 16 feet wide and 2. That the village pays not to exceed \$25,000 out of the Road Construction Fund for these changes, and that the cost for these changes not be included in the total for assessment, and 3. Add that Herbst Excavating, who is already working in the area, put in a 6" base, with #304 stone where needed. Ritchie adds that he is surprised that the engineers of CT Consulting did not catch this problem when they were doing the bid package. **Motion to do the three items that Ritchie has just mentioned**, made by Ritchie, second by Feyedelem; all in favor; motion passed. Village Administrator Stevenson says that the village will have to raise some storm drains as part of the Sweetbriar Road Project. Ritchie says that he just found all this out today or else he would have communicated with everyone about it before the meeting.

7.M. Streets & Sidewalks- L. Marchky says that the report has pretty much been given already but he wants to get a letter out to residents about sidewalks. The Village Administrator is doing the letter. Marchky wants to see the water line replaced on Huntington soon so that the road can be paved this fall. Marchky adds that some truck

drivers were told to not use Division Street, to go around the west side. Mayor Paine says that he spoke to someone and they may have misunderstood.

7.N. Park Board- James Erne reports that the Park Board had a meeting and they discussed many things. Nothing formal has come before the Board. The Board completed the Compliance Reports for both new parks with US Fish and Wildlife and the Western Reserve Land Conservancy. The Zettler family paid for the full cost of planting a memorial tree in the ball park outfield. The Western Reserve Land Conservancy called to say that they were opposed to a dirt bike track on the Huntley-Beatty Preserve. He then received a second call from a different member of the Land Conservancy who got an email from the same person and he said that they were opposed also. Someone called the Land Conservancy and got them all upset before ever coming to the Park Board. Mr. Erne asks that everyone come first to the Park Board instead of trying to go around them.

7.O. Mayor's Financial Report- For April, the Court received no payments. No check was paid to the Village or the State. Bank expenses amounted to \$650.22. The Court is in the process of setting up online payments, and using a different company for credit card payments in order to reduce bank expenses. No bond is being held at this time. Mayor Paine mentions that on the agenda, item number 11.2 has the Mayor's name associated with the legislation. He is not a sponsor for the legislation and Council Member Ritchie has agreed to sponsor it. There are two ordinances for the runway length and he suggests passing the one that has 2,200 feet mentioned in the ordinance, but the decision is up to council.

7.P Legal- D. Lambros says that for 11.2 , Councilman Ritchie has agreed to sponsor it. There are two ordinances for the FAA Runway length, one which mentions specifically the current runway length of 2,200 feet. After the presentation by Councilman Ritchie, Solicitor Lambros suggests that council pass the legislation that specifically mentions the length of 2,200 feet.

7.Q Treasurer's Report- C. Brown reports that members of council have the usual fund and treasurer's reports in their packets. PERS has not yet reviewed the wage ordinances that were sent to them, but they said they will do it soon. Brown was contacted about starting the audit soon. The threshold has been increased for the

Agreed Upon Procedures Audit (AUP). They look at your prior audits and we were OK'd to do the AUP Audit and we are going to do it. The estimate is that we will save a minimum of 40% off the last audit cost, and maybe more. The only problem that Brown sees in having the new type of audit is that she knows there are some posting errors in 2012. Brown has looked for the errors and couldn't find them and they include some confusion with the bank. If a regular audit was being done, the auditors would find the errors, but the auditors have advised Brown that with the AUP Audit, they will not look for the miss posting(s). It requires a separate contract. The estimate to do that work is \$656.00 (\$41/hour) and it might take less time. Brown asks council to authorize that separate contract expenditure, because errors in postings could affect fund balances. The last audit cost the village almost \$13,000 so the estimated minimum savings will be about \$5,200 with the AUP Audit. Finger says that it is because of the past good work done by Brown that the village has the possibility of this less expensive AUP Audit and that even with the additional contract the savings will be substantial so he supports Brown's request. **Motion to authorize the additional contract with the State Auditors to look for the concerns of the Clerk-Treasurer**, made by Seeholzer, second by Marchky; all in favor; motion carried. Brown adds that this week has been designated as Municipal Clerk's Week. (applause)

9. First Readings

RESOLUTION NO. 2013-R_____ : A RESOLUTION DECLARING THAT CERTAIN LANDS KNOWN AS 403 WARD ROAD, KELLEYS ISLAND, OHIO, UNDERLYING LAKE ERIE AND LOCATED WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF THE VILLAGE OF KELLEYS ISLAND, OHIO, ARE NOT NEEDED FOR DEVELOPMENT OR IMPROVEMENT.

This legislation was on the agenda for passage tonight, but council had a first reading instead because council wants to see more information about it. During the discussion on the legislation Mayor Paine says that the 4-H Camp wants this passed because they are going for a grant. Marchky asks why the village is giving this away ? He wants to

look into this more. What if they want to build a dock ? Finger replies that this is the same process if someone wants to build a dock. Solicitor Lambros says that it was not drafted as an emergency. There is an exhibit that council might want to take some time to look at. Solicitor Lambros says that council can do a first reading and look at it next month. He adds that anything in the lake requires approval of the State of Ohio and the State is not going to give approval unless the village passes this ordinance. This is just the ordinance that says the village has no plans to use the property.

SECTION 5705.19(F) CERTIFYING THE SAME TO THE BOARD OF ELECTIONS OF ERIE COUNTY, OHIO

AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. (INTRODUCED BY: MAYOR KYLE PAINE)

Brown explains that about four years ago the voters passed a levy to pay the loan that was required to repave the runway. The levy was over five years and the loan was over ten years. This renewal will finish off the loan payments, then the levy will go away. Mayor says that the village also promised the granting agency that the runway would remain intact for the duration of the loan. That also means that the runway can't be moved until this loan is paid off.

Mayor Paine says that this is not the legislation that would send the levy to the ballot and he did not attend the Finance Meeting where this was discussed. That is why he does not want to introduce the legislation.

Seeholzer explains that at the Finance Meeting where this was discussed, the sponsors were to be Feyedelem, Ritchie, and Seeholzer.

Solicitor Lambros explains that the legislation is time sensitive.

12. Items from the Mayor

12.1 Mayor Paine would like to see a tape recorder purchased to be used for committee meetings.

13. Items from Council

13.1 Marchky says that people have asked him if the village could secure cameras from Homeland Security for outside locations. Mayor Paine says that the major problem is sign damage and deer cams could be used for that. Finger suggests that a committee meeting be set to discuss it. Mayor Paine thinks that one at the airport would be good.

13.2 Feyedelem says that he has three things. Last year council was passed legislation to get the name of a street changed and the sign has not been changed yet. The street is Bianchi Lane. Council had also been asked to pass a tree ordinance by emergency and did, but he is not aware that anything else happened ? He asks the Village Administrator and the response is that nothing has yet been done. The last item is about the firewood ordinance. He asks if anyone has notified the State Park and the boat line about having signs that no firewood is allowed to be transported to the island ? Mayor Paine asks Marchky if he would look into that. Solicitor Lambros says that council passed an ordinance that makes transporting firewood to Kelleys Island illegal. The boat dock has a sign in their window. We have the mechanism, now we need enforcement. The Village Administrator asks what happens if someone comes over with firewood and says they didn't see the sign. Should we put a big sign up ? Mayor Paine says that the village has to work out what to do with the firewood. Merkle says that KI Chamber can put the information on the website.

Seeholzer asks about the Bianchi road sign. McNeal is present and he says that signs cost between \$100 and \$150 if he orders a single sign. Seeholzer asks that the sign be ordered. Village Administrator says that the sign will be ordered.

13.3 Finger asks that the Park Board identify the placement for the pads under the picnic tables in the park.

14. Old Business

14.1 Refuse Board needs a member from the public to serve on it- no one come forward until the meeting is ending and then Bob Maier volunteers.

15. Public Participation for people interested in addressing council.

15.1 Lori Mizla, 2166 S. Olaf Dr., Marblehead, OH introduces herself as the Program Director of Life Flight and Mobile Life. In 1998 they started providing service to Kelleys Island. In 2001 Sharon Devine came on. It is hard to find volunteers anywhere today. Last year 24 patients were flown off the island, but only 8 went to St. V's. If someone is sick in the winter, we have equipment on the island now that can keep someone alive for three days. The \$9,500 that the village pays to St. V's is a small amount compared to replacing this contract with a paid paramedic and EMT. There is a lot of down time here on the island and not everyone can take that. Lori Mizla reiterates that Sharon works for her, not the Kelleys Island Fire Dept.. If there are any problems, Lori Mizla wants them addressed with her, not Sharon. Marchky says that in the past the Village Clerk was sending requests for donations to people who received the service and names have been requested but no one complies by sending the names and addresses. Mizla says that St. V's does the billing and Kelleys Island cannot. Brown interjects that the question is not the billing, the council knows that. But in the past she received the names and addresses of patients to send letters requesting donations. Mizla says that may not be possible because of HIPPA rules. Brown asks her to investigate it and get back to her, because if it is not possible to get the names and addresses then council needs to change legislation.

Mayor Paine says that someone may move here who is a nurse.

15.2 Steve Merkel, 909 E. Lakeshore Dr., Kelleys Island thanks council and the village for their support in the Sweetbriar Road Project. Merkel wants to talk about the Chamber projects this summer. The 5K/10K run will start at 10:45 am on Sunday, June 9th. This is the 31st race. Last year 700 runners participated. The Chamber is following procedures and they will work with the Police Dept.

The Chamber worked on the Tall Ship Celebration all winter. He has a preliminary schedule of events. Kelleys Island is the host port for the Appledor IV. The ship can take passengers. After Boston, we need to provide security issues for the event. It will not involve money from the village. The Chamber is planning island-wide venues, including 4-H and the school. Events include a lot of educational things. The Island Singers are doing patriotic songs. The Chamber wants to offer plane rides from the airport, not helicopter rides and Merkel asks what they have to do with the village to have the plane rides. Brown suggests that Merkle speak with Solicitor Lambros, especially about insurance that may be required. Finger asks if there is a good spot on Kelleys Island to view the activities ? Merkle says that the actual event is being done by the Perry Group. At noon on Monday about 17 ships leave Put-In-Bay to go to about where the buoy is now, but nothing can be seen from Kelleys Island. There will be a huge flotilla of boats and you can only see the re-enactment from the flotilla. You have to sign up and pay a fee to be part of the flotilla if you want to be in your own boat. Planes overhead will also be limited.

EMS One Mission. One Team.

WHEREAS, Kelleys Island Emergency Medical Services (EMS) is a vital public service; and

WHEREAS, access to quality emergency care dramatically improves the survival and recovery rate of those who experience sudden illness or injury; and

WHEREAS, Kelleys Island EMS plays a critical role in public outreach and injury prevention, and is evolving in its role as an important member of the healthcare community; and

WHEREAS, Kelleys Island first responders, emergency medical technicians and paramedics stand ready to provide compassionate, lifesaving care to those in need 24 hours a day, seven days a week; and

WHEREAS, emergency medical responders are supported by emergency medical dispatchers, firefighters, law enforcement officers, educators, administrators, researchers, emergency nurses, emergency physicians and others; and

WHEREAS, the members of EMS teams, both career and volunteer, engage in thousands of hours of specialized training and continuing education to enhance their lifesaving skills; and
